Volunteering at Carousel

Lena Western already had a year's experience of voluntary work at the West Exe Children's Centre when Carousel Toy Library opened, and she began helping as a Volunteer.

A place where friendships can be made

For Lena and other parents this opportunity to meet together is extremely valuable, and a place where friendships are built. Parents who are on their own or new to the area can feel a bit isolated and need the chance to mix with other people their own age.

Try before you buy!

Lena says she particularly appreciates the chance for her two children to try out toys from the Toy Library. She and other family members have in the past spent a lot of money on toys that after a short while get pushed into cupboards and don't come out again! At the Toy Library, parents can come, hire, let their children get enjoyment from the toys, then bring them back and swap them for something else. It doesn't matter how many times each item is hired, Lena says it still wouldn't add up to the cost of buying the toy.



Learning from watching your child play

Lena helps put out a selection of toys and additionally parents can take any toy from the stock cupboards. She has noticed how parents watch their children play, and how children will go and join in other children's play. In this way small children get to mix together and play before they are old enough for playgroups.

The value of being a volunteer

Lena says that being a volunteer is very worthwhile. It has given her a sense of purpose, and the opportunity to meet new people and to learn new things, eg how to catalogue toys and how the

Toy Library systems work. She gets particular satisfaction from being able to reunite missing pieces of equipment when they turn up again. She also enjoys hearing other parent's views on toys, and being able to recommend toys to other parents that have given her own children pleasure.

Thank Heavens for the Toy Library!

Okay, so there is no pot of gold at the end of the rainbow, BUT, for families and child carers in Exeter there is the Toy Library.

I work in a Charitable Pre-school in a local Church Hall and, like so many other Pre-schools, our toys and equipment are either donated by out-grown children or bought with hard-earned fundraising money. We would love to be able to flick through the glossy catalogues and say; "I'll have this, and that, and the other." Our reality isn't like that (and probably never will be). This is where Fiona comes to the rescue.

Last term we explored celebrations and festivals with the children. Under Fiona's guidance we borrowed a superb book from Merry Go Round, 'Usborne's Encyclopedia of World Religions' which introduces many celebrations from different cultures and was fascinating for us adults to read.

Fiona then directed me to other books which are written specifically for children and which contain appropriate photographs and illustrations to bring the festivals of Divali, Eid-ul-Fitr and Hanukkah to life. Some of the books contained ideas of activities suitable for doing with the children. Having the Toy Library and Scrapstore in the same building makes it easy to get scrap for making some of the ideas in the books.

We also borrowed sets of A4 laminated photographs depicting scenes from the relevant countries which were a great starting point for discussions with the children. We were able to supplement our own range of multi-cultural dolls and dressing-up clothes and these were very popular.

Fiona's enthusiasm and resourcefulness is infectious and makes a trip to the Toy Library really enjoyable. Perhaps that is why I always come out with more than I intended. And the great thing is, it is affordable. Thank you, Toy Library.



West Exe and Carousel

I am a Family Support Worker at West Exe Children's Centre and a deputy Team Leader at the Saturday Club - a club for children aged 8yrs to 18yrs with special needs. I have recently joined both these services to Carousel Toy Library here at West Exe Children's Centre.

The Saturday Club has limited funding and there is rarely spare money for play equipment. We also have limited storage space, especially for bigger pieces of equipment. By using the toy library I have been able to borrow a good selection of toys that are ideal for children with special needs. It enables me to try out the toys before looking for the funds to buy such equipment which is usually very expensive. We have a total of 30 children with a range of sensory, motor and behavioural difficulties, in three teams so as you can imagine it is difficult to provide the right equipment for all these children. The toy library allows me to experiment with different types of toys and to get in specific toys for specific children.

As a Family Support worker the toy library enables me to add variety to our equipment. We see different children and families so it is nice to be able to collect a special toy or piece of equipment. It can also help with our aims for a family; if we are trying to encourage a specific area of play we can hire a toy that will promote this. We encourage our families to use the toy library and this is more easily done when they see us using it.

Fiona is often able to recommend toys or equipment if we describe a particular need or area that we wish to promote which is always helpful. The toy library is a very useful resource for both these services.
